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Edmonton Exchange Wrap-up

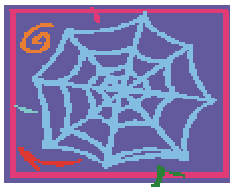

STEPHANIE FISHER-MATHEWS
Some background info.

I was born in Rio de Janeiro, GB (Guanabara), Brazil when it was still the capital. My parents were Americans serving abroad in the U.S. Foreign Service. Children born abroad of U.S. citizens in service for their government were automatically deemed U.S. citizens. For some reason my father thought it would be fun to register me with the Brazilian government as well, thus granting me dual citizenship. Because I was not a male, I didn't have to declare my loyalty to one country or the other in order to serve in the military. So I grew up with two passports, two homelands, and two native languages.

After serving in Rio for 10 years with an eighteen month hiatus back in NYC during the McCarthy era, we were transferred to Paris, France for two years where I learned French both in school and on the streets by playing with the concierge's kids from across the street. Next we were assigned to Saigon, South Vietnam –what a culture shock, especially since we were coming from urbane, polished Paris in a spectacular two-story apartment. Saigon was considered a hardship post in the Foreign Service, yet the second language was French, so we had a leg up on communicating with the locals. We did strive to learn some Vietnamese by hiring an instructor who came to our house at lunch time, but because that was the hottest time of day when most people used the break for a siesta before going back to work, we eventually gave in and gave up the lessons. I still know how to count to ten, greet people, and remember a few practical phrases (which surprise the Vietnamese manicurists in town)!

After my father suffered a heart attack in early 1960 and the Viet Cong's (communist North Vietnamese) activities became too violent in the south, we were transferred to Washington, D.C. where we lived for about six years. That was another culture shock for me because the D.C. school I attended seemed huge and the classroom structure was very different. Overseas I was used to having the teachers rotate through our one classroom but now I had to find my way from class to class; catch up on more advanced math; make new friends and get used to riding public buses to school.

I went as far as 5th year French and then had to choose between Latin and German as they didn't offer more advanced French classes, so I chose German to finish the language requirements my senior year.

I attended Georgetown University's School of Languages and Linguistics where I majored in Portuguese and minored in French. As luck would have it my parents were transferred to Brazil once again, so I was able to take my junior year abroad at the University of São Paulo and live at home. It was a bit heady living the privileged diplomatic life with all the wonderful cultural events and fancy parties; maids and cooks to do your bidding, chauffeurs to drive you, oh my!

Back in D.C., I worked summers at the Voice of America, got retail experience at a department store, taught English as a Foreign Language, then taught Portuguese at a language institute.

After graduation I worked as a translator at the OAS in D.C. and used my four languages (I acquired Spanish along the way), worked at conferences in various Latin American and Caribbean member countries and had eye-opening experiences in countries I wouldn't have chosen to visit on my own. Went back to G.U. for graduate school while working at the OAS, got married, divorced, moved to Florida, opened a cake and dessert bakery, and wound up working for the U.S. Department of State as a contract Portuguese interpreter. I have revisited São Paulo several times to see friends and reconnect with my native country, and that is how I stay fairly current with both the language and evolving customs. It doesn't hurt to frequent our local Brazilian restaurant, either.

I have been based in Sarasota since 1979 and still need the excitement of travel –it is forever in my blood!
